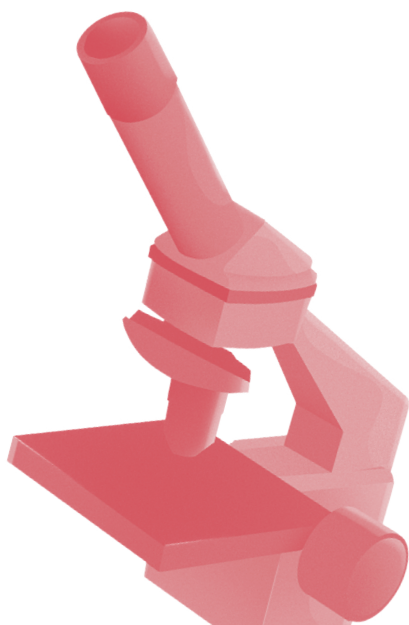
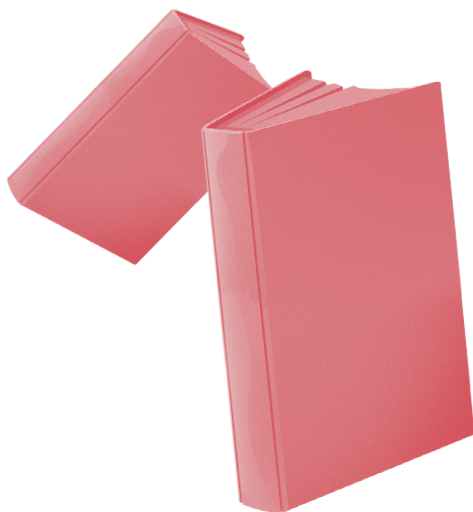

# The Foundation

## Foreword

In a constantly evolving philanthropic landscape, Swiss Philanthropy Foundation has been guiding private and institutional donors since 2006, providing them with professional, reliable support tailored to their specific philanthropic goals.

As an independent charitable umbrella foundation, we facilitate the creation and management of philanthropic funds both in Switzerland and abroad. Drawing on our expertise in providing top-quality services, the Foundation enables philanthropists to carry out their charitable activities within a secure, transparent framework geared towards sustainable impact.

Guided by principles of professionalism, transparency and good governance, our dedicated team of experts work together to deliver meaningful initiatives and provide long-term support for the projects championed by the Foundation.

## Activity overview

Throughout 2024 and 2025, we continued to expand our activities and redoubled our commitment to structured philanthropic giving. 2024 was marked by the launch and activation of several new initiatives, including a youth-led collaborative fund, a new thematic fund for peace and a rapid-response mechanism for crises. Concurrently, we contributed to ongoing strategic discussions in the philanthropic sector, including by hosting a conference that brought together hundreds of participants to explore the role of philanthropy amid the prevailing uncertainty around the world.

In 2025, we continued our networking and educational efforts, in particular through the Master Class in Philanthropy, an annual event that brings together professionals and philanthropists to discuss the regulatory framework and best practices governing charitable activities. The Foundation also participated in various events and joint initiatives, especially in Geneva. And we further built out our governance and team, welcoming a new director general, Alexandra Bilak, alongside several new staff members. Finally, we reached a major milestone, surpassing CHF 500 million entrusted to us since our inception. This achievement serves to underscore the relevance of the Foundation's philanthropic model and the scale of our impact.

# Philanthropic solutions for diverse visions

We work with a wide variety of individuals and institutions, each driven by their own unique motivations, horizons and goals. To cater to this diversity, we have developed a suite of complementary solutions that combine flexibility, rigour and efficiency, enabling each donor to carry out their giving in a systematic way that serves the greater good.

## Supporting individual donors **Private funds**

For individuals, families or groups of friends looking to organise their charitable giving, **private funds** offer an ideal solution. Private funds enable donors to carry out their personal charitable vision in a secure, transparent setting, while delegating all of the administrative, financial and governance aspects to our experts.

This format provides donors the freedom to focus fully on the causes they care about – whether local projects or international initiatives – while benefiting from professional guidance. Some private funds also slot into legacy planning, in particular **testamentary funds**. These funds enable charitable giving to continue beyond a lifetime, ensuring a lasting impact. In this case, the Foundation's role is to ensure that donors' wishes are properly executed by managing and disbursing the funds after their passing. We do so in strict accordance with the objectives set out during their lifetime and our established governance procedures.

## Private fund “Pipistrel”

Established in December 2024 and hosted by the Foundation, “Pipistrel” embodies a wide-ranging philanthropic approach, aiming to support initiatives in health, education, scientific research, culture, environmental protection, sustainable development, and social and humanitarian aid. Through this multidisciplinary approach, the fund seeks to contribute to projects that offer tangible, sustainable solutions to current challenges.

In its very first year, the fund supported specific projects led by three universities, evidence of its commitment to swift, targeted action to advance scientific research. These initial contributions reflect Pipistrel’s dedication to encouraging innovation and financing pioneering, interdisciplinary projects to break down traditional silos and foster new solutions for global health.

## Testamentary fund “Lumière”

The “Lumière” fund illustrates how testamentary funds can transform a charitable vision into a lasting legacy, translating it over time into concrete impact. This fund supports education, youth integration, aid for marginalised groups and projects that promote access to clean water, primarily in French-speaking Switzerland and Africa. True to its founder’s intentions, the fund prioritises community-based projects that generate impact locally, rather than large-scale international programmes.

In 2025, the fund entered its implementation phase and was formally activated. An initial contribution was disbursed via the Foundation’s social-impact thematic fund to support the Caritas Montagnards project, which actively helps mountain farming families facing hardship. With this first step, the donor’s wishes have begun to gradually take shape through support that makes a tangible difference on the ground.

## Driving systemic transformations: Institutional funds

Institutional funds enact a desire to drive systematic change. Established by foundations, businesses or organisations, they target complex challenges by mobilising substantial resources and formalising long-term impact strategies.

Institutional funds take various forms. **Collaborative funds** bring together multiple stakeholders around a shared cause and strategy, promoting resource pooling and the development of innovative solutions. The fund To Zero is a prime example, bringing together international partners to coordinate the global fight against child sexual abuse and build operational capacity worldwide.

Other initiatives are designed for long-term sustainability. The **endowment fund** for the International School of Geneva, for example, seeks to build long-term capital to secure the school's future development. By funding innovative, evidence-based teaching methods, it helps improve the quality of education for generations to come.

**Project funds** are dedicated to supporting a specific programme or initiative with a clearly defined goal and timeframe. They channel financial resources towards targeted activities, ensuring traceability and alignment with the project leader's mission. The Safe & Sound Cities (S<sup>2</sup>Cities) programme exemplifies this approach. By empowering young people to participate in urban planning, it helps build more inclusive, safe and sustainable cities.

## Collaborative fund “To Zero”

“To Zero” is a collaborative fund that aims to align global organisations fighting against child sexual abuse by establishing a shared vision and overcoming existing barriers. Created in the United States in late 2023, it joined the Foundation in 2025. To Zero’s core activities include developing effective communications and organising international workshops to share best practices and provide training, fostering a safer childhood and, ultimately, a better world.

## Project fund “SUEP GIB”

In 2026, the project fund “SUEP GIB” celebrates its fifth year of collaboration with our Foundation in support of the S<sup>2</sup>Cities programme. S<sup>2</sup>Cities is led by the Global Infrastructure Basel Foundation (GIB) with the support of Fondation Botnar and is hosted by Swiss Philanthropy Foundation. Operating as a global, project-based fund across multiple continents, S<sup>2</sup>Cities works to improve the safety and well-being of young people aged 15 to 24 in rapidly growing mid-sized cities, while encouraging their active participation in urban infrastructure planning and decision-making.

## Endowment fund “Ecolint”

The “Ecolint” Endowment Fund was created by the International School of Geneva (Ecolint) with the goal of building a capital reserve to secure the school’s future. With an initial endowment of several million francs, the fund has already begun supporting educational projects, in particular by funding the introduction of innovative teaching methods across Ecolint campuses. By bolstering the school’s ability to design and implement high-quality educational programmes, this endowment aims to provide sustainable, capacity-building support for generations to come.

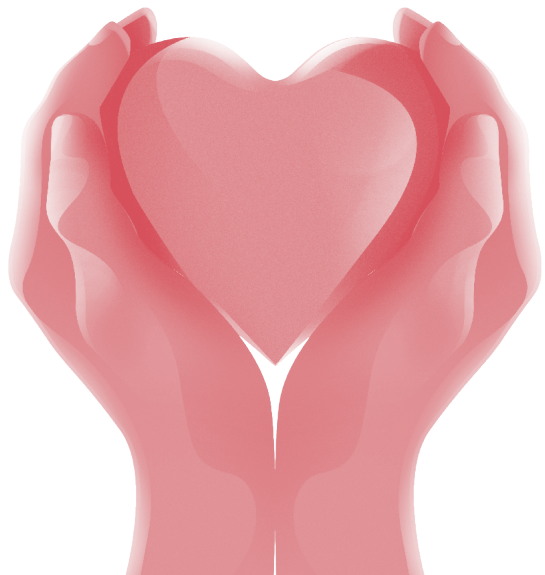

## Fostering collective giving

### **Thematic funds**

For donors who wish to begin giving gradually or to diversify their contributions, thematic funds provide an accessible, guided approach. They offer access to rigorously selected projects overseen by experts and foster a culture of learning and peer exchange.

Thematic funds provide particularly significant leverage, backing tangible projects in vital areas such as education, health, poverty reduction and environmental protection. In Brazil, for example, one initiative used large-scale data analysis incorporating millions of data points to identify over a thousand cases of wildlife trafficking. In Afghanistan, projects are helping women achieve economic independence by providing sustainable training and entrepreneurial opportunities. In 2025, we launched our fifth thematic fund around the concept of peace, giving donors the opportunity to engage with the critical issues that define our times.



## Thematic fund “Peace Fund”

In 2025, we launched the “Peace Fund” to generate synergies amplifying impact and driving lasting change in an increasingly volatile world. Over the course of the year, the fund supported the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons, the Stop Killer Robots campaign and the Lex International Fund. The Peace Fund chose to focus on these three organisations because they address the most pressing threats capable of causing catastrophic, large-scale consequences: nuclear weapons, the development of artificial intelligence-based weapon systems and challenges to the international legal framework governing weapons and armed conflict. By working together through this fund and leveraging their partnerships and networks, these organisations reduce their administrative and operational overheads while maximising their impact.

## Encouraging youth involvement Collaborative fund “Demaimpact”

The “Demaimpact” collaborative fund has continued its commitment to inclusive, participatory charitable giving by empowering young people from all backgrounds to actively select the projects it supports. Guided by philanthropy experts, Demaimpact’s committee brings together young people from French-speaking Switzerland to set priorities and allocate grants.

In 2024, the committee selected four organisations working in mental health and youth integration. In 2025, a new call for projects resulted in the funding of six additional initiatives focusing on youth social integration, education and the environment. The supported projects have already yielded encouraging results, in particular by helping beneficiary organisations scale their organisational capacity through a financial leveraging effect. Demaimpact’s work underscores the value of a participatory approach that places young people at the centre of decision-making to support projects designed by and for youth.

## Facilitating cross-border philanthropy International networks and partnerships

In a deeply interconnected world, philanthropy naturally crosses borders. We want to support this dynamic and provide solutions to facilitate cross-border donations within a reliable and secure framework.

Through the Giving Europe network, which the Swiss Philanthropy Foundation represents in Switzerland, donors can support recognised charitable organisations across 17 European countries while benefiting from an appropriate tax framework. Furthermore, our general donation fund channels contributions to organisations worldwide – including Europe, the United States, Africa, Asia and Latin America – while upholding the highest standards of governance and due diligence.

Beyond facilitating international giving, we are an active member and partner of global networks such as Philea and the Myriad Alliance, which enables us to share best practices and foster connections among stakeholders in the philanthropy sector. In this way, we act as a conduit for donors and institutions to come together to tackle major global challenges.



## Swiss Philanthropy Foundation joins the Myriad Alliance

In June 2025, we entered into a strategic partnership with the Myriad Alliance. This partnership is perfectly aligned with our ambition to facilitate cross-border charitable giving by collaborating with leading networks. As host to numerous multilateral organisations and diaspora communities, Switzerland holds a unique position in the global philanthropic ecosystem. This backdrop – alongside our successful experience in 2020 with the rapid-response COVID fund, where we mobilised global donors in record time – strengthened our desire to join a network offering a strategic, flexible and efficient framework for cross-border giving. This partnership with the Myriad Alliance enables us to expand our geographic reach in a complementary manner while simultaneously deepening our existing ties with the Giving Europe network.

## Building skills **The Master Class in Philanthropy**

Beyond facilitating donations, the Foundation is actively engaged in developing and professionalising the philanthropic sector. The Master Class in Philanthropy is a prime example of this commitment. Developed in partnership with the Geneva Centre for Philanthropy of the University of Geneva and the Center for Philanthropy Studies of the University of Basel, it provides a unique forum for learning and networking that has already brought together over 300 participants, helping to build an informed and engaged community.



## The Master Class in Philanthropy

The 12<sup>th</sup> edition of the Master Class in Philanthropy took place from 26 to 28 March 2025, welcoming 29 participants from foundations, family offices and banks as well as legal experts and private philanthropists. The programme is enjoying growing success and is fostering a vibrant, supportive alumni community that actively shapes best practices and guides the charitable ecosystem in a lasting manner. This community gathered for an evening debate hosted by Swiss Philanthropy Foundation on 13 November 2025 to discuss the current challenges facing Swiss and international charitable efforts.

## Promoting philanthropy The “World in Crisis” conference

On 15 April 2024, the Maison de la Paix in Geneva hosted a conference organised by the Foundation and dedicated to charitable engagement, bringing together 300 participants for four themed panel discussions. Set against a backdrop of global uncertainty and complex challenges, the gathering aimed to highlight practical, accessible, innovative solutions for building a better world. The goal was to inspire philanthropists, foundations and project leaders to take action, whether individually or collectively, by championing simple yet impactful approaches.

The conference was centred around four panels: integrating youth into grant governance, pooling resources, strategies for rapid disbursement of funds and responding to global challenges. These discussions, recordings of which are available on our website, were a venue to share experiences, best practices and innovative visions.

The conference helped cement Geneva’s reputation as an international hub for philanthropy and social innovation. It encouraged networking among stakeholders, stimulated collaboration and fostered the emergence of new forms of engagement. The conference’s success lay in its ability to make philanthropy more accessible, practical and attuned to contemporary challenges, while simultaneously generating lasting benefits for both the local and international ecosystem.

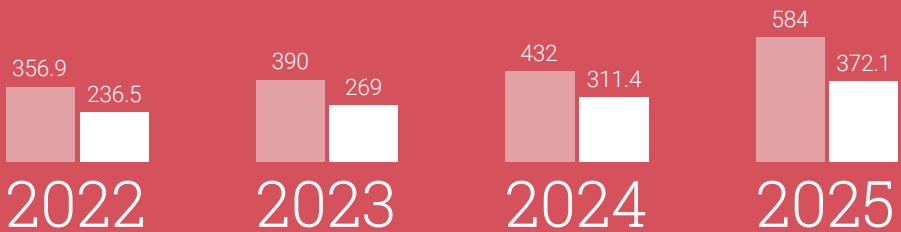

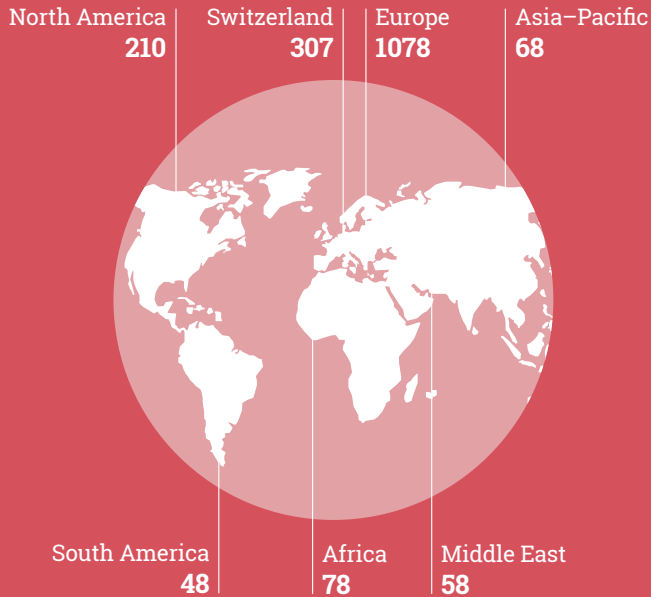

# Interview with our Director General

Amid rapidly evolving charitable practices and increasingly complex global challenges, the 2024 – 2025 period proved to be a significant milestone for the Foundation. The growth in hosted funds, diversification of donor profiles and consolidation of partnerships have all contributed to shifting our positioning and operational methods.

Alexandra Bilak, the Foundation's new director general, reflects on the trends that shaped the last two years and shares her priorities.

**We are seeing a rise in collaborative institutional funds hosted under the Foundation. How do you interpret this trend?**

The trend reflects a profound transformation in the broader context of modern philanthropy. The challenges we face – whether related to climate change, global health or international cooperation – have become global, interdependent and highly complex.

Against this backdrop, it is becoming clear that no single entity can operate effectively in isolation. That fact is driving a growing desire, particularly among foundations, to pool resources, expertise and strategies.

As a result, we are witnessing the growth of joint efforts via institutional funds that rally Swiss and international players around

major causes. This shift reflects how philanthropic giving is adapting to an increasingly interconnected world, with collective responses to systemic challenges.

**The Foundation's growth in recent years seems to back up the model of the umbrella foundation. How do you view this growing interest?**

We are indeed seeing practical proof that the umbrella foundation model works. Today, an increasing number of philanthropists are looking for flexible, efficient, agile solutions without wanting the burden of creating and running their own administrative entity.

The rising demand for our services shows not only that this model is now widely understood but also that it meets a proven need. This is a strong indicator of both its relevance and its ability to carve out a lasting place within the philanthropic landscape.

**Today, the Foundation seems to blend strong local roots with international reach. How do you manage to maintain this balance?**

This balance is central to our identity. We are deeply rooted in Geneva and Switzerland, which enables us to remain close to local stakeholders and to concrete needs.

At the same time, our operations are distinctly international. The funds we host support projects in numerous countries, covering a vast array of themes. This diversity reflects the Foundation's ability to operate effectively, from local to global. It also underscores our integration into Swiss, European and international philanthropic networks, which bolsters our credibility and operational capacity. It is precisely this combination of local grounding and global reach that makes the foundation unique today.

**Given the results achieved over the 2024 – 2025 period, what will be the Foundation's main strategic priorities in the coming years?**

Our recent performance places us at a pivotal juncture, focusing on consolidation and growth. The challenge for the coming years will be to transform growth into sustainable gains and long-term drivers of change. Within a rapidly shifting philanthropic landscape, the Foundation has a genuine opportunity to further improve its value proposition and establish itself as the premier partner for private and institutional donors.

A priority will be elevating the quality of the support we provide. Beyond acting as a facilitator, we aim to strengthen our role as a strategic partner to philanthropists. Doing so will enable us to build lasting, trust-based relationships while attracting new donor profiles.

Finally, we want to continue positioning the Foundation as a benchmark organisation and a source of inspiration, both in Switzerland and internationally, while actively participating in discussions about sector trends, new models of cooperation and responses to the major challenges of our time.

# Our governance and team

The Foundation's Board of Trustees oversees the Foundation's activities in line with a good governance charter. The Board currently comprises eight members and meets four times a year. In its work, the Board relies on the Finance Committee, which advises on matters relating to investment policy, financial investments and resource allocation. The Bureau of the Board meets monthly.

Day-to-day operational management of the Foundation is handled by a diverse team of 15 staff members. They ensure our processes are efficient and responsive while maintaining rigorous management of the hosted funds and fostering close relationships with donors and all members of our local and international ecosystem.

Following the departure of Director General Sabrina Grassi on 28 February 2025, the Board carried out a recruitment process. Alexandra Bilak was appointed Director General and assumed her role on 1 November 2025.

With nearly 15 years of executive-level experience and 25 years in the non-profit sector, Ms. Bilak has a proven track record in developing organisations both in Switzerland and abroad.
